Audiences – who do we want to reach?

- 1. Parents of children aged 12 months to 17 years.
- 2. Young people aged 18-26, who are less likely to have been vaccinated as children due to the concern over links between MMR and autism, following a study which has since been disproved.
- 3. Other adults who may have missed one or both MMR doses.
- 4. Targeted communications and outreach is ongoing with refugee and asylum seekers.

Is your child fully vaccinated against measles?

Measles is a very contagious disease that can make kids seriously unwell if they're not fully vaccinated, and cases are increasing in London.

The only protection against the most severe forms of the disease is two doses of the measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine, which every child can get for free at their GP.

Check if your child is up to date on their measles vaccinations by looking in their Red Book or vaccine record. If you're not sure, and to book a free vaccine appointment, contact your GP. It's never too late to catch up.

If your child is at primary or secondary school in Camden, you can also book a free vaccine appointment with the school aged immunisations service by calling **020 3317 5076**.

Check that you are fully vaccinated against measles

Measles is a very contagious disease that can make you seriously unwell if you're not fully vaccinated, and cases are increasing in London.

The only protection against the most severe forms of the disease is two doses of the measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine, which everyone can get for free at their GP.

Check if you are up to date on your measles vaccinations by checking your vaccine record. If you're not sure, and to book a free vaccine appointment, contact your GP. It's never too late to catch up.

If you were born between 1998 and 2004 it's especially important to check that you have had two doses of MMR, as you are less likely to have been vaccinated against measles when you were a child. This is because of a 1998 study that linked the measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine with autism. This study has been disproven – there is no link between MMR and autism.
