SUEZ social value in Greater Manchester

April 2024 – March 2025

Greater Manchester-wide

This report covers social value created by SUEZ in each Greater Manchester council area between April 2024 – March 2025. The report does not cover Wigan as they are not part of the Greater Manchester waste contracts and have separate waste disposal arrangements.

As part of the Greater Manchester waste contract SUEZ has 54 social value commitments.

The commitments below apply across Greater Manchester

- Employing around 669 staff in Greater Manchester.
- All SUEZ staff on the Greater Manchester contracts are paid at least the Real Living Wage.
- Training available for staff to increase their professional skills (e.g. CIPD, MBA or levels 2/3/4 accredited training opportunities) to support career progression.
- SUEZ in Greater Manchester is a member of the Good Employment Charter.
- Wellbeing support is offered to all staff as well as several wellbeing webinars each year, such as, 'Sleep smart support for shift workers', 'how heart smart are you?' and 'Breaking the stigma of men's mental health'.
- Aiming for 60% of total expenditure to be within the Greater Manchester boundary and 60% of supply chain spend on SMEs, social enterprises, micro-businesses and third sector organisations.
- 100% total electricity supply sourced from renewable sources and energy efficiency improvements have been made to lighting at several sites.
- Reduce amount of waste going to landfill to 2% in the last contract year less than 0.5 percent of Greater Manchester waste was landfilled.
- Across the contracts, SUEZ sites are making changes to be more sustainable
 including buying free trade tea and coffee, removing disposable cutlery, ensuring every
 site has appropriate recycling facilities for staff, rolling out reuse of PPE and taking part
 in a company wide IT return scheme.
- SUEZ has two national charity partners, Macmillan Cancer Support and British Heart Foundation. Staff support these through coffee mornings, sponsored events and fundraising.

Renew donations

As part of the Renew project each year SUEZ is committed to donating £100,000 to the Greater Manchester Mayor's Charity and £220,000 to the Recycle for Greater Manchester Community Fund.

Recycle for Greater Manchester (R4GM) Community Fund

In 2024/25 21 community and voluntary sector groups were awarded funding from the R4GM Community Fund. The individual projects are listed in each of the council reports.

Greater Manchester Mayor's Charity



The £100,000 donation to the Greater Manchester Mayor's Charity supports their work preventing homelessness in the city region. The donation makes SUEZ the charity's largest financial backer and allows them to carry out their day-to-day work. With support from SUEZ and other corporate partners in 2024/2025 the charity provided the following support:

- £30,000 grant to Embassy Village in Manchester.
- £30,000 grant to fund the Greater Manchester Homelessness Action Network (GMHAN) Network Manager - operating across Greater Manchester and building capacity and resource to amplify the work and learnings of the Greater Manchester homelessness ecosystem.
- £260,000 grant to A Bed Every Night, equating to over 8,600 nights of accommodation and wrap around support, operating in all boroughs of the region
- £50,000k of small grants including:
 - £10k to a young persons project, enabling cash transfers to young people at risk of homelessness across Greater Manchester
 - £10k to support a refuge for migrant women at risk of homelessness fleeing domestic violence in Wigan
 - £10,000 to support a services looking after health of children in temporary accommodation in Oldham
 - £7,795 to support drop in service provision for women who sex work and are at risk of homelessness in Manchester

- £10,000 to support migrant distribution fund in Manchester and Greater Manchester
- o £2,205 to support move on provision in Manchester to be fully accessible
- The Renew team donated a re-upholstered chair to the charity to be sold at a silent auction.

Employment, apprenticeships and supplier events

Staff employment

 110 staff employed by SUEZ work in Bolton including at recycling centres, Raikes Lane energy from waste plant and workshop and head office at Higher Swan Lane.

Apprenticeships created in Bolton

- Two HGV Fitter apprentices were recruited at the Higher Swan Lane workshop.
- Two Business Administration apprentices joined the Contract Data Team based in Higher Swan Lane.

• Supplier event held at Raikes Lane energy from waste plant resulted in Coles Security from Bolton contracted to provide additional security services at the site.

School engagement

Work experience

- Two students from Eden Boys Secondary School completed a one-week work experience placement
- One student from Sharples High School completed a one-week work week work experience placement

School careers activities and mock interviews

- Canon Slade School:
 - SUEZ staff took part in a 'careers carousel', speaking to around 300 pupils about green skills and careers in waste and resources.
- St. Joseph's RC High School
 - Two SUEZ staff attended two careers' fairs at St. Joseph's speaking to families about green skills and careers in waste and resources.
- Mount St. Joseph's Secondary School,
 - Took part in a career's day at Mount St. Joesph's, talking to around 120 students.
- Bolton St. Catherine's Academy
 - o SUEZ staff spoke to around 200 students at a careers fair at St. Catherine's.
 - o SUEZ staff helped carry out mock interviews, speaking to six year 10 students.

- Bolton Sixth Form
 - Staff took part in a STEM careers panel with 80 students.
- Sharples School
 - Staff took part in a careers fair and speed networking, speaking to around 45 students.
 - o Staff helped with mock interviews, speaking to 9 students.

Educational visits and tours

- Two environmental education sessions and tours of the Raikes Lane energy from waste site were delivered for 21 environmental management master's students from the University of Bolton.
- The Renew Hub hosted a Greater Manchester Youth Network careers workshop which included seven care leavers from Bolton.

Talks and education sessions:

- On World Earth Day SUEZ staff delivered an educational talk to 35 engineering apprentices at Alliance Learning in Horwich. The session looked at 'What does the future hold for plastic in waste management?'.
- A second talk was held at Alliance Learning focusing on 'Sustainability and Green Careers'.

Community and charity support

Recycle for Greater Manchester Community Fund

Two organisations in Bolton received funding from the Recycle for Greater Manchester Community Fund in 2024/25. These were:

- Old to New Saving the Environment run by Anna Sukoon which received £10,000.
 This project focuses on recycling old clothes into durable bags and offering affordable clothing repairs, educating the public about textile waste and its environmental impact.
- Recycle-IT! received £10,000 to help expand their computer recycling hub in Market Place shopping centre, helping increase local engagement, and provide more educational workshops on digital inclusion and sustainability.

Additional Greater Manchester-wide projects run by Become United and Cracking Good Food also benefitted communities in Bolton.

SUEZ Communities Fund

The SUEZ Communities Fund supports community and environmental improvement projects through the Landfill Communities Fund, distributing funds contributed by SUEZ. The following organisations in Bolton received funding:

- **Bolton at Home** £20,000 for community centre refurbishment.

- Horwich Foodshare: received donations from a food drive at the Higher Swan Lane office and a Greater Manchester-wide food delivery including pet food.
- **Ivy Road Community Project**: Nine SUEZ staff from the Contract Data team volunteered to support the development of a sensory garden.
- Bolton Wanderers in the Community: Two members of the team from Salford Road Transfer Station took part in a charity sleep out event to raised funds for Bolton Wanderers in the Community.
- Friends of Harwood and Longsight Park: Seven SUEZ staff members for the Higher Swan Lane workshop volunteered with to clear disability pathways of overgrown grass verges and assist in removing old paint and repainting the frames around the children's play area.

- Salford Road Transfer Station installed two new planters that were donated from the Renew Hub in Trafford Park.
- **Higher Swan Lane** installed two new bug hotels at the site and four planters made from reused tyres and bins.
- Hurstwood Court recycling centre installed new bug hotel on the site.
- Raikes Lane energy from waste plant installed five new bug hotels, a hedgehog house and seven bird boxes around the site. Four planters were also made using old pallet wood. Rainwater harvesting installed to support wildflower planting.

Tree planting

30 SUEZ staff helped plant 360 native trees with City of Trees at Haslam Park,
 Bolton, enhancing biodiversity and supporting climate resilience.

Litter picks

- The Raikes Lane team carried out a local litter pick and 15 bags of litter were collected and disposed of.
- Raikes Lane team also carried out a litter pick around Raikes Clough, collecting around 20 bags of litter.
- A team from the Higher Swan Lane office worked with Bolton at Home and residents to collect 50 bags of litter.
- Fleet workshop team from **Higher Swan Lane** carried out a litter pick around the grounds of Pikes Lane Primary School, removing 32 bags of waste.
- Regular litter picking also takes place around all the SUEZ operated sites in Bolton to ensure they look clean and tidy.

School refill shop programme

SUEZ provided a £5,000 donation to a GMCA project to support environmental awareness through the creation of refill shops in schools. The funding helped the scheme expand to 15 more schools in Greater Manchester including two in Bolton:

Recycle for Greater Manchester Community Fund

Four organisations in Manchester received funding from the Recycle for Greater Manchester Community Fund in 2024/25. These were:

- Wesley Community Furniture Recycle, Revamp, Reuse run by the Big Life Group.
 They received £9,780 to run weekly upcycling and repair workshops, art groups and
 events to highlight the importance of recycling, reusing, repairing, and upskilling the
 local community.
- Manchester Cycling Academy CIC in Moss Side received £9,950 to support the
 Cycle Revival bike workshop. The workshop focused on giving new life to bicycles that
 end up in waste and e-bikes with worn-out batteries.
- Groundwork Greater Manchester received £10,000 to run Rag Revival, a project
 aiming to recycle and repurpose unusable textile waste. These are upcycled into crafts
 and creations using basic sewing skills taught to participants.
- Healthy Me Healthy Communities received £10,000 towards the Gorton Food Hub.
 This was to support low-cost food pantries, an emergency food bag service, referrals and signposting, and food courses and activities. These initiatives help people manage

their budget and food waste, improve their knowledge and skills to maintain a healthy diet, and enhance employability.
