**Title:** Political Balance 2026-27: July 2026

## Summary

1. This report considers changes to political group composition following the by-election held on 25 June 2026 and recommends the allocation of council committee seats to political groups as detailed in the report.
2. Since the previous political balance calculation, approved in May 2026, Councillor George Braeckman, Conservative, has been elected to the ward seat of Stort Valley.
3. Therefore, the Council's political composition is now: 18 Residents for Uttlesford, 11 Conservative Party, 3 Liberal Democrats, 3 Reform UK, 2 Uttlesford Independent Group and 1 Independent (unaffiliated). For the purposes of this political balance calculation, there is now 1 vacant ward seat (Great Dunmow North ward).
4. As per the Local Government Housing Act 1989 and Local Government (Committees and Political Groups) Regulations 1990, the political balance calculation is based only on councillors who are members of a political group, with formal political groups requiring at least two members. Therefore, this calculation has factored in the political groups of Council only and committee seats have been allocated accordingly.

## Recommendations

5. That Council approves:
  - I. The political balance and the allocation of seats on its committees as detailed in the report.
  - II. Committee appointments as set-out in Appendix 1 to the report.

## Situation

9. The Local Government Housing Act 1989 requires local authorities to review the representation of the different political groups and allocate the seats on their committees to political groups represented in accordance, so far as reasonably practicable, with the following four principles of proportionality:-
- a) that not all seats on the body concerned are allocated to the same political group;
  - b) that the majority of the seats on the body are allocated to a particular political group if the number of persons belonging to that group is a majority of the authority's membership;
  - c) subject to paragraphs (a) and (b) above, that the number of seats on the ordinary committees of an authority which are allocated to each political group bears the same proportion to the total of all the seats on the ordinary committees of that authority as is borne by the number of members of that group to the membership of the authority;
  - d) subject to paragraphs (a) to (c) above, that the number of the seats on the body which are allocated to each political group bears the same

proportion to the number of all seats on that body as is borne by the number of members of that group to the membership of the authority.

10. The number of seats on ordinary committees of the Council is proposed as follows:

11. Based on the 59 committee seats proposal, the number of seats available to each group is:

12. Members will note that it is not possible to round-up all fractional numbers above 0.5 in regards to Group allocations, specifically the Conservative Group allocation to 18 seats. The calculation meets the principles of political balance

as the Conservative Group has the lowest fractional number above 0.5. This proposal has been shared with all Group Leaders for the purposes of the report and committee nominations.

### Licensing and Environmental Health Committee

13. The Licensing and Environmental Health Committee cannot be taken into account for the purposes of the calculation because it is not a committee to which the Local Government Act 1972 applies. However, it is proposed that the ten places available to be allocated to the Licensing and Environmental Health Committee be calculated on the same basis of proportionality applied to those committees falling under the 1972 Act. It is a requirement that the Licensing and Environmental Health Committee has between 10-15 members.

### Proposal for Allocation of Seats

14. The allocation of the 59 seats is therefore proposed as follows:
